Samaritan Car Care Clinic 1428 Madison Avenue Covington, Kentucky 41011 he Samaritan Car Care Clinic is finally officially OPEN! After several months of construction and permitting delays, the Clinic was able to open for business on August 1. The Clinic began moving tools from Jim Dennis' shop in Elsmere late July to the Clinic shop in Covington. Many thanks to St. Vincent de Paul of NKY for loaning the Clinic a box truck (with a powered lift!) so that tools and equipment could be relocated.

The Clinic operates as what is called a Social Enterprise Model. The Clinic schedules a blend of repairs for regular paying customers, as well as partial pay customers referred to the Clinic by our social service agency partners. Work is largely done by Jim and his two apprentices, Lee Gibson and José Frias, both with Gateway Community College (photo top, right). The Clinic is also incredibly fortunate to have volunteers who help several days each month around the shop in any way they can.

One huge thank you to all of the supporters who kept the dream alive of opening the region's first dedicated non-profit vehicle repair shop. With your great help, the Clinic is keeping families on the path to self-sufficiency.



Recognition Updates

Impact 100 Includes SCCC in 2023 Funding Round



Impact 100 is a group of over 500 philanthropic women in Greater Cincinnati who sponsor an annual grant award process for non-profits. The goal is to support innovative and transformative projects that address community needs. Impact 100 members raise enough funds each year to provide four \$100,000 grants.

The Samaritan Car Care Clinic was one of just over 100 initial applicants to be considered for a grant in 2023. The Clinic's grant idea was to provide safe and reliable transportation for women referred to the Clinic by Ion Center for Violence Prevention, and Brighton Center.

In June 2023, Impact 100 announced that the Clinic made it to the Finalist round of seven non-profits. And from those seven, four would receive grants.

On September 12, 2023, Impact 100 held its annual award gala. And fortunately for the women the Clinic will be able to help, **Impact 100 members chose the Clinic to receive one of the four grants.** The \$100,000 will fund a vehicle purchase program to support low-income single moms at Brighton Center and Ion Center for Violence Prevention.
