

Samaritan Car Care Clinic 1428 Madison Avenue Covington, Kentucky 41011 gaining traction in the snow; leaking power steering pumps finally fail; and more. It is the sad reality of wintertime driving when you can't afford maintenance and repairs.

Your tremendous support allowed the Samaritan Car Care Clinic to help almost 350 families in 2024 with desperately needed vehicle repairs and maintenance. Similar to prior years, about 3/4ths of referrals were female headed households. The Clinic was able to help all those families because of donations received from more than 250 individuals, and several dozen foundations and companies. Together we can celebrate that the Clinic exceeded its goal of helping at least 300 families. 300 was the original stretch goal for 2024, since the number of families helped was 237 in 2023.

Was the Clinic able to help everyone referred for help? No, we don't have enough funding for that yet. But in a "glass half full" statement, the Clinic had to turn away fewer families in 2024 compared to previous years because of your generous donations. How much does your Clinic need to raise to exceed its stretch goal? At least \$10,000 every week.

In addition to celebrating our financial supporters, this newsletter continues our tradition of celebrating our volunteers. The Clinic has enough hands-on volunteers to provide a weekend maintenance event at least once each month, (two this past December!). Volunteers also sweep, wash and wax donated vehicles, and even bring books for the Clinic's Book Bay for children.



Thank you does not seem enough, but we offer the Clinic's sincere gratitude for the great work made possible because of support from donors and volunteers. Please continue your financial support for the Clinic throughout 2025, and spread the word about the Clinic's incredible impact, so that we can again exceed our goal of helping at least 300 families stay on the path to self-sufficiency!

The special connection with the Honda Pilot behind Kassi in the photo to the right is that the vehicle was donated to the Clinic with the specific goal of helping an Ion Center client. With funding from the 2023 Impact 100 grant, the Clinic was able to perform the necessary repairs and maintenance to help make Kassi's new-to-her vehicle as road worthy as possible and safe for her children. Ion Center was also able to assist with the \$1,000 purchase price.

The balance of the repair costs were covered with the Impact 100 grant.
